

The small car class in Australia is hotly contested and one of the most popular in the class is the Hyundai i30, having driven quite a few of it's competitors including the Holden Cruze SRiV the week before I was very interested to see how the i30 shaped up.

We know what a hot hatch is and there are some wickedly quick hot hatches on the market but the down side to a hot hatch is they can cost upwards of \$40,000 or more which in my mind is a lot of money for a small car. But lately several manufacturers have brought what could be best described as warm hatches, now as the term suggests warm hatch aren't quite as quick as a hot hatch.

The up side to this is that while they might not quite have the outright speed of a hot hatch, they do offer however offer reasonable performance and a very entertaining drive and the case of the i30 SR at a saving of more then \$10,000 than a hot hatch and to me that's a decent amount of money.
